News From Our Superintendent

Finishing the First Quarter Strong at West Central

The first quarter of the 2019-2020 school year came and went. It's been a great 9 weeks. There are countless successes I could chronicle here. However, I'll give you the highlights as I see them from the Superintendent's seat.

While West Central's enrollment was down compared to last year, it was up slightly from our projections. On count day we had 735 students enrolled K-12 including a large kindergarten class. We hope this indicates more young families are moving here and staying here because our county is safe and affordable. We continue to host the Medaryville Nursery School and Head Start on our campus.

Through collaborative efforts we've been able to integrate our future Trojans into our school community to compensate for Indiana not providing for preschool funding.

Despite our small size, West Central continues to offer big-time opportunities for students, including advance manufacturing, welding, CNA certification, band, choir, art, a wide array of sports, plus traditional coursework in core subjects. There is something for everyone. Our Fall Sports have made some steps forward, including a strong start to the football season which tapered off after a plague of injuries. Our marching band continues to grow and impress at halftime and contests. Our winter sports are gearing up for great seasons, too.

On the facilities front, we secured a \$100,000 matching grant for safety upgrades. We are exited to have qualified for such a significant sum, which will free up local money for other improvements. While it took some time, our new Information System is in full swing. Additionally, our investments in instructional technology are reaping fruit, as evidenced by our successful eLearning day on September 25th.

This fall we redoubled our efforts to ensure West Central is a place where learning is first, and we have seen our students take heart and apply themselves with a new vigor. This will play out in test scores now, but more importantly, we want it to play out in our students' long-term success in life after school. We want to thank the community for its continued support as we make West Central the best school it can be!



Minimum high school graduation requirements (Core 40) are: 40 Credits and passing the ISTEP for both Mathematics and Language Arts.

- 8 Credits of English
- 6 Credits of Math
- 6 Credits of Science
- 1 Credit of Health
- 2 Credit of Physical Education
- 1 Credit of Preparing for College/Career
- 6 Credits of Social Studies (1 Gov't, 2 U.S. History, & 2 World History/Geography, Economics)
- 10 Elective Credits

In addition, students must be enrolled in a Math or Quantitative Reasoning course each year of high school. STUDENTS in grades 10-12 who have not passed ISTEP may opt to pursue a Graduation Pathway in lieu of passing ISTEP. ALL students in the class of 2023 and beyond MUST complete a Graduation Pathway.


College requirements are increasing. Each college sets its own admissions requirements. State supported colleges are not required to accept Indiana graduates.

Some colleges have standard requirements for all students to meet in order to be admitted to the college. Other colleges have each department within the college establish their respective requirements. Purdue University has different admissions requirements for each department. Two years of a foreign language is a requirement for many four-year colleges.

High Grades + High SAT/ACT Scores = More \$\$\$ in scholarships, grants and financial aid!! Students need to be encouraged to take high school seriously from the beginning of 9<sup>th</sup> grade and beyond.

**HepB:** The minimum age for the 3rd dose of Hepatitis B is 24 weeks of age.**DTaP:** 4 doses of DTaP/DTP/DT are acceptable if 4th dose was administered on or after child's 4th birthday.

**Polio\*:** 3 doses of Polio are acceptable for all grade levels if the 3rd dose was given on or after the 4th birthday and at least 6 months after the previous dose.

\*For students in grades K-10, the final dose must be administered on or after the 4th birthday and be administered at least 6 months after the previous dose.

**Varicella:** Physician documentation of disease history, including month and year, is proof of immunity for children entering preschool through 12th grade. Parent report of disease history is not acceptable.

**Tdap:** There is no minimum interval from the last Td dose.

The Indiana State Department of Health believes that protecting Indiana's citizens from vaccinepreventable diseases is one of the most important roles of public health. Indiana is experiencing an increase in hepatitis A cases. To ensure that all of Indiana's youth are properly protected against this disease, new school immunization requirements are being implemented for fall 2020. All students in kindergarten through 12th grade who attend an accredited school in Indiana will be required to have two doses of hepatitis A vaccine for the 2020-21 school year.

Records from the Indiana Children and Hoosiers Immunization Registry Program (CHIRP) indicate that your child has not completed the two-dose hepatitis A vaccine series. Hepatitis A vaccine is recommended by the Advisory Committee of Immunization Practices for all ages and is safe and effective at preventing hepatitis A, a highly contagious liver infection. The Hepatitis A vaccine series is a two dose series that requires six months between doses. Please contact your healthcare provider to discuss options for vaccination and if your child is eligible to receive publicly-funded vaccine.

Please make an appointment with your healthcare provider to complete the series and discuss any other adolescent vaccines that might be needed to protect your child from vaccinepreventable diseases and/or cancer, including human papillomavirus (HPV) and meningitis B.

If you have questions about your child's immunization history, MyVaxIndiana is an online tool that allows individuals to access their immunization records after receiving a secure personal information number (PIN) from their healthcare providers. This tool enables individuals to view, print or electronically stores their records since 2012. Please ask your healthcare provider how to access your child's record.

# 21st Century Scholar

## What is 21st Century Scholars?

The 21st Century Scholars program was established in 1990 to increase students' aspirations for and access to higher education. The Scholars Program provides <u>7th and 8th grade</u> income-eligible students the opportunity to earn a scholarship that covers up to four years of tuition and regularly assessed fees. 21st Century Scholars supports eligible students and parents with the tools they need to prepare for college, graduate on time and begin a successful career. The scholarship is awarded on an annual basis. Scholars are provided resources and assistance to help them plan and prepare for college and pay for expenses not covered by their scholarship. The scholarship does not cover the cost of books or room and board.



# Everyday Preventive Actions That Can **Help Fight Germs, Like Flu**



### CDC recommends a three-step approach to fighting the flu.

CDC recommends a three-step approach to fighting influenza (flu). The first and most important step is to get a flu vaccination each year. But if you get the flu, there are prescription antiviral drugs that can treat your illness. Early treatment is especially important for the elderly, the very young, people with certain chronic health conditions, and pregnant women. Finally, everyday preventive actions may slow the spread of germs that cause respiratory (nose, throat, and lungs) illnesses, like flu. This flyer contains information about everyday preventive actions.

#### How does the flu spread?

Flu viruses are thought to spread mainly from person to person through droplets made when people with flu cough, sneeze, or talk. Flu viruses also may spread when people touch something with flu virus on it and then touch their mouth, eyes, or nose. Many other viruses spread these ways too.People infected with flu may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5-7 days after becoming sick. That means you may be able to spread the flu to someone else before you know you are sick as well as while you are sick. Young children, those who are severely ill, and those who have severely weakened immune systems may be able to infect others for longer than 5-7 days.

#### What are everyday preventive actions?

- Try to avoid close contact with sick people.
- If you or your child gets sick with flu-like illness, CDC recommends that you (or your child) stay home for at least 24 hours after the fever is gone except to get medical care or for other necessities. The fever should be gone without the use of a fever-reducing medicine.
- While sick, limit contact with others as much as possible to keep from infecting them.
- Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Germs spread this way.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs like the flu.
- If an outbreak of flu or another illness occurs, follow public health advice. This may include information about how to increase distance between people and other measures.
